Partnering with the American University of Sulaymaniyah (AUIS), Humatdijlah, and Environmentkeepers, we provided AUIS students with an opportunity to experience the reservoir firsthand.

However, our efforts were not without challenges. In a recent interview with Aryen TV, Nabil Musa, our Waterkeeper, expressed concerns about the construction of the Ilisu Dam, part of the GAP project. This dam threatened the existence of a Kurdish village and posed risks to numerous communities. As Waterkeepers Iraq, we strongly advocated against such dam projects, emphasizing the unifying role of rivers in connecting communities and their irreplaceable value.

The annual report also sheds light on the issue of fines collected from polluters in the Kurdistan Region. Despite the intention of using these fines to fund environmental initiatives and expand inspections, the funds were routinely diverted for other purposes, hindering our ability to carry out necessary operations and enhance our activities.

In conclusion, the annual report of Waterkeepers Iraq for the year 2020 reflects our ongoing commitment to protect and preserve the rivers of Iraq.
